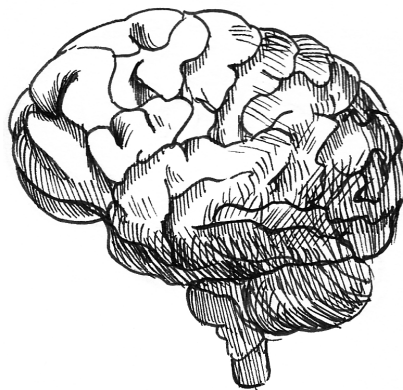
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## The American Journal of Psychology

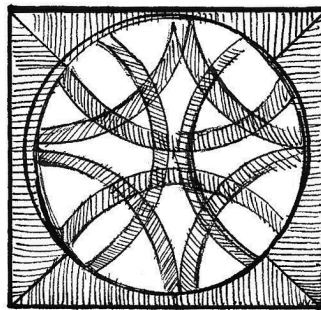
# AMERICAN JOURNAL OF THEOLOGY & PHILOSOPHY

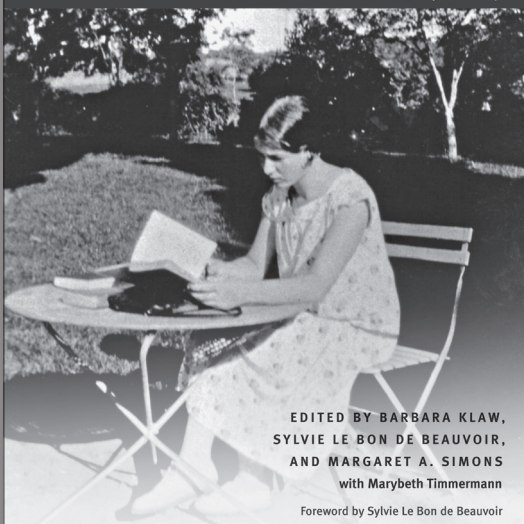

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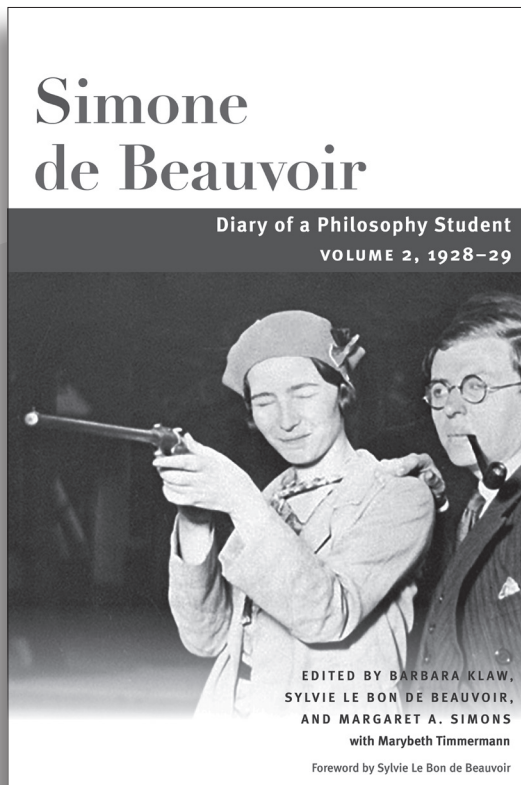

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# HPQ

In order to ensure anonymity of submissions, authors using Word are advised to go to “File . . . Properties . . .” and delete all author-identifying information, under all tabs.
