MANUSCRIPTS

Contributions may be as short as 3,000 words or as long as 8,500. All manuscripts should be typewritten with wide margins, and at least double spacing between lines. Endnotes should be used sparingly and should be numbered consecutively, typed with wide margins and double spacing, and placed at the end of the paper. The journal will consider only papers whose authors certify that, while under consideration with us, their papers will not be submitted elsewhere for consideration.

Public Affairs Quarterly (PAQ) publishes work in all areas of practically engaged normative philosophy, broadly understood to include normative work on issues of public concern in applied moral, social, political, and legal philosophy. Topics covered by the journal include subjects of long-standing debate such as abortion, capital punishment, and just war theory; more recently emerging subjects of controversy such as climate change, affirmative action, commercial surrogacy, and the treatment of non-human animals; topics relating to current social movements relating to racism and sexual harassment, and to current technological developments such as gene editing and autonomous weapons systems. Submissions of a more general nature that address implications for a cluster of such issues rather than focusing on a single issue are welcome. These topics include race, sexuality, gender, social identity, nationalism, paternalism, privacy, distributive justice, economic fairness, political inequality, and commodification.
