The *Journal of Appalachian Studies (JAS)*, the official journal of the ASA, is a refereed, multidisciplinary journal published twice per year by the University of Illinois Press for the Appalachian Studies Association (ASA) with support from Marshall University. *JAS* seeks to provide a written forum for quality scholarship on Appalachian history, culture, and society. These topics include, but are not limited to, activism, arts, economics, education, environment, gender, labor, literature, LGBTQ, migration, politics/government, and race/ethnicity, religion, and women's studies. The *Journal of Appalachian Studies* supersedes earlier publications of the Appalachian Studies Association, including *Proceedings* and *Journal of the Appalachian Studies Association*.

Subscriptions: Regular individual online subscription rates are \$110 per year (student rate \$85), and include annual membership in the Appalachian Studies Association. Add \$20 for print. Membership fees are non-refundable and non-transferable. Annual library and institutional rates are \$79 for print only; \$117 for print and electronic; and \$98 for electronic only. There is an additional postage charge of \$10 for mailing addresses in Canada and Mexico and \$15 for all other non-US addresses. Manuscript Submissions: We are interested in articles based on original empirical research, including applied research, as well as literary criticism and reflections on conceptual, theoretical, and methodological issues in Appalachian studies. Given the *Journal's* broad readership, we encourage consideration of the wider implications of each study. Submissions must be written in a style that can be understood by non-specialists.

We will consider rigorous scholarship from scholars, teachers, activists, and others whose work focuses on the Appalachian region. The current editor invites scholarship which compares the Appalachian region to other regions in the world and places the region in a critical, global context. All submissions are expected to demonstrate an understanding of relevant Appalachian studies literature.

Submissions should be double-spaced and numbered in Times New Roman, 12 point font. Please follow the word count limits below:

- Articles: should be between 5,000–7,000 words including notes, citations, and references.
- Teaching, Community, and Research Notes: a maximum of 4,000 words including notes, citations, and references.

Articles should be submitted electronically to the *JAS* online manuscript submission portal: <http://caxton.press.uillinois.edu/journals/ojs/index.php/jas/user/register>. This secure, personalized resource will allow you to track your manuscript through each step of the review and acceptance process. Your transmitted material will be reviewed as soon as possible.

Submitted manuscripts must follow the *Journal's* guidelines for notes, citations, and references, etc.

- *JAS* uses a blind review system. Do not include your name or affiliation on the manuscript. See guidelines on the submission portal.
- Please list all authors and include a brief bio of each (no more than 30 words per person) when submitting. Sample: Christopher Leadingham is a PhD candidate in the history department at the University of Kentucky and is the associate editor of the *Journal of Appalachian Studies*.
- Please include an abstract of up to 200 words.
- Submit written permissions for any text, images, or other content protected by copyright. Consent to publish forms will be provided to authors for signature.
- The author should verify that the manuscript has not been published previously and is not being submitted for publication elsewhere.
- Submit roundtables and other compendiums by multiple authors as a single document.
