Contributors are requested to refer to the editions listed above and to follow this style in manuscript preparation. Regular footnotes shall be used only when added information is supplied.

**Beginning with PS 8/3, we cite PR first according to the Corrected Edition edited by David Ray Griffin and Donald W. Sherburne (New York: The Free Press, 1978), then according to the Macmillan 1929 edition.*
